After hearing from the Membership Committee, Emily Yaffe gave a special presentation, encouraging members to join committees to prepare for:

The Club's - 100th Anniversary

"As a longstanding member of the Sarasota Garden Club, I want to bring to everybody's attention that we are soon to celebrate our 100th Anniversary."

Emily took us all back to the club's beginning, portraying a scene which saw our founder, Mrs. John Ringling, sitting in her Great Room, sharing a cup of tea (or maybe something stronger) with a few of her closest friends and neighbors, as the Club was formed. Our club's new members must feel just like those initial members, looking for a niche of some personal interest they have: our club. FIRST OFFICIAL GARDEN CLUB MEETING: 1927.

"I feel how their love of gardening helped create this club. She grew unique plants and flowers in her Secret Garden (which is still maintained by some SGC Members volunteers), many of which were gifted to her from their friends and prestigious visitors from other states and countries.

The Garden Club that Mable Ringling and her friends started, way back, grew exponentially in the coming years, reaching 700+ members, until wartime hit - which saw women going to work and garden 'clubbing' fell by the wayside.

I am particularly proud to recall the poster of Rosie the Riveter (right), when women worked in the steel mills, built ships and aircraft, worked on farms and took over many male positions, urbanely and professionally.

In its own way, our Garden Club is another fine example of 'We Can Do It'!

THE FOUNDERS: Our first Garden Club CIRCLE (group – in 1928) comprised 30 women whose names are inscribed on our library document (below – and I see there's a Bond there!), and they helped set the stage for their future

members to raise monies to build our current clubhouse, which was dedicated in 1960, and we moved in.





Looking back on all this history and information about how it may have happened, made me realize, it truly only happened one way – with each other helping one another.

No one does anything alone in this Club

It truly takes a village for some events, like GIP, to make them a success and also to be done **well**. (Sometimes I think we make it look too easy, and people don't understand how much work has gone in to it).

Webster's Dictionary definition of a Club: an **organization** dedicated to a particular interest or activity

WE are dedicated to our club, its events, its meetings, its programs and types of education.

None of the things mentioned happened solely by one person...
they happened by many helping along the way.
This club needs its members.


She also offered several plants for sale from her nursery (which is right next door to Tropiflora).

Carol Lackey, Programs Chair, organized for us to visit TROPIFLORA which we quickly learnt from the owners' son, Scott, has been growing Bromeliads, which they specialize in,

along with air plants and a few orchids, since 1976.



INTERESTING FACT: TROPIFLORA won the contract to design and install the fantastical display of bromeliads in the Supertree Grove gardens in Singapore!

Scott, his sister Robin, and Daisy and Percy (the 2 dogs) gave us the tour and 'family history' (which is fascinating – their parents visited caves in Cuba and found the smallest frog in the world – and they have been to Asia over 200 times and are nicknamed the 'Indiana Jones of Bromeliads'). **Who knew?**

The plant-houses are **VAST!**

The tour showed us the numerous plant-houses, each with different degrees of light/shade – plants in "The Sun House" enjoyed full sun and were able to do this thanks to their tough, spiny leaves.

Bromeliads that could tolerate low or intermittent light were housed in other aptly-named houses.



TROPIFLORA has between 8–10,000 varieties of bromeliads, 4,000 of which are the colorful ones that can only tolerate early morning light.

District VIII Judge's Council Meeting – Manatee

<u>As a guest</u> at the Manatee Flower Club on 25th March, it was interesting to see how other clubs operate. This was the "District VIII Judge's Council" meeting (which are not always open to guests - but they had such a good speaker they wanted to share).

Each of the 12 <u>Districts</u> in Florida have a <u>Judge's Council</u>, which is made up of all the Flower Show Judges in their district. You might also have heard of **Floralia**, which are smaller groups of Flower Show judges (we have Floralia XVI which is in Sarasota, Floralia II which meets in homes, and Floralia VI which meets at Manatee River Garden Club).

GUEST SPEAKER: Mayfair Hydro and her colleague gave an entertaining and informational design program entitled "**Imagine**" - demonstrating several flower arrangements, with special attention being paid as to how they would be JUDGED in a competition, specifically for the audience.









We were shown a beautiful way to decorate a large palm leaf by trimming it to size and winding copper-colored wool around its fronds, as you can see from the pictures >>>>

"Just so you know" - next year, the Sarasota Garden Club Education Committee will be presenting flower design techniques just like this - in a series of presentations, much like those given prior to our Flower Show by Claire Milligan.





Flower Show School - Course 3:

Flower Show Procedure, Intro. to The Flower Show Handbook: 'Horticulture' is Caladiums and Combination Plantings / 'Design' is Multi-rhythmic and Transparency.

Note: you do not have to take these classes in sequence i.e. you don't have to have attended Courses 1 and 2, to benefit from 3 (and 4 later).


