District VIII Matching Grants

Four District VIII Matching Grants were awarded in January 2025.

Manatee River Garden Club was awarded \$500 in matching District VIII grant funds to help offset some of the expenses required to restore club grounds damaged by hurricanes Helen and Milton.

Apollo Beach Garden Club awarded \$500 in matching District VIII grant funds to rebuild and replant a dragon fruit trellis damaged by the recent hurricanes.

Lemon Bay Garden Club awarded \$500 in matching District VIII grant funds to help offset some of the expenses required to restore gardens including the butterfly garden damaged by the recent hurricanes.

Every year the City of St Petersburg, Florida, hosts The Green Thumb Festival in one of their 83 City Parks. The Festival has demonstrations, information booths and over 100 Horticulture and Gardening Related Vendors. This year there was a butterfly tent, kids crafts, food vendors workshops as well as Arborists and city Environmental Department representatives.

The Garden Club of St Petersburg has been able to take part in this venue as a Community Outreach Program for many years. The Garden Club participation includes a children's workshop tent, a Garden Club Membership table and a BIG Floral Design and Horticulture show inside the main building.

The show entitled "Tropical Paradise" was open to the public and attracted 2,381 visitors who came through the building, chatted with the hosts on duty, voted for their favorite Design and Horticulture entries and learned about all the beautiful plants they too can grow. This year 67 member volunteers participated in the show to help with everything from set up, plant placement, clerks, hostess and Judge's Luncheon. 45 Members exhibited their growing ability by entering 264 beautiful plants along with entries in design, botanical arts, artistic crafts, photography, miniature dish gardens and educational presentations regarding the Coral Reefs and Camp Wekiva.

Education exhibits showed local efforts to maintain coral reefs, protect nesting turtles on the beaches as well as Camp Wekiva. Seed starting kits, donated by Lowe's, were handed out to enable people of all ages to start their own vegetable and flower gardens.

This year the event was Judged by Florida Federation Judges on April 25th. The Festival opened to the Public at 9AM on Saturday April 26th and again on Sunday April 27th. Next year's festival and Flower Show is April 25-26, 2026. Hope to see you there.







Apollo Beach Garden Club & Community Forest Garden

We really cannot write about one part of our organization without including the other as they are very intertwined in their activities. As you know our Community Forest Garden was hit hard with a 4 foot salt water surge with Helene then, what that didn't damage the winds and more rain from Milton helped uproot many of our larger fruit trees. We have learned what trees and plants can take some salt water and which quickly succumb to it and the long-term 'wet roots'.

With the help of some tremendous member and community support the garden was cleaned; grants from FFGC, District VIII, Tampa Garden Circle, Tampa Garden Club, and Riverview Garden Club we have been able to replace equipment, and most of all, to replace the many trees and fruiting bushes we had lost. We cannot even begin to express our gratitude to them and our community. Mother Nature is resilient and the garden is beginning to flourish again. The new trees won't bear fruit this year, but are growing amazingly.

Because there was so much rain after the surge we did not replace all the soil in our 24 garden plots, only added soil to fill up what had washed out. The plants have grown very well in the community demonstration beds and member's beds. We have decided to replace our cedar wooden beds, due to rot, with a higher metal bed and will begin that process this summer as funds allow.

We are trying something new this summer in a series of mini workshops on Saturday mornings of (1) gathering, preparing and saving seeds, (2) starting plants from cuttings, (3) air-layering, and (4) seed planting 101. The last workshop will be the start of our preparation for our November 8th Fall Plant Sale. This series was the idea of our Marketing & Event Chair, Teresa Hall. We want to encourage community to learn and & to come to the Garden. She & I have grown some heat-tolerant veggie plants and native flowering plants that are available to purchase as a mini fundraiser.

The first session we did during National Gardening Week and attracted several community members to join us.. Our local paper picked up the story on the workshops and ran a front page article this week. We expect that will really peak community members to come for the remaining sessions and ultimately to want to become members of the Club and Garden.
